# Invaluable Life Skills Prepare Youth for Independent Living

If you need to know how to fill out a student financial aid form, find mental health support in Toronto or get familiar with your rights as a tenant, ask Elise Yusef.

As a follow-up support worker, she knows how to navigate the many challenges of living in Toronto—and she shares it all with the youth she works with.

"I'm a trans Black woman and I was precariously housed for a period of time, so I have an understanding of how difficult independent living can be " she says.

Working exclusively in the community, Elise has a caseload of youth new to living independently. Some come from the shelter system, while others are refugees or new immigrants. She works with each person for about a year, helping them with the specific life skills they need.

That might mean learning how to budget for common expenses, save for the future and live within their means.

"A lot of times, I play the role of an aunty. Talking to youth about cleaning up their place, sharing tips for success, and encouraging them to take advantage of other programming available at Eva's."

She often explores neighbourhoods with youth, connecting them to affordable cultural food sources and other necessities.

"There are a lot of resources that many people don't know exist, whether that's how to access government funding for a gym membership or find ESL courses and recreational activities" she says.

When it comes to finding community, she seeks to understand what matters most to youth.

"I try to give youth the tools they need to function in society and build a satisfying life for themselves."

#### Who We Serve

We recently conducted our second annual youth survey to deepen our understanding of the demographics of those we support, ensuring our services align with their evolving needs.

The survey results underscore a significant increase in the number of Black, newcomer, and 2SLGBTQ+ youth seeking assistance from Eva's.


